Now that the year is at a close, we at Abacus for Communities (AfC) wish to share our achievements with you all, none of which would have been possible without the help and support of our partners, associates, volunteers and staff.

Our three main objectives follow:

- To establish a trained corps of volunteer emergency telecommunications operators and equip them to provide and access emergency services to communities before, during and after disaster events.
- To design and establish a community emergency telecommunications system i.e. the Emergency Affiliated Radio Service (E.A.R.S.), including procuring equipment and network resources.
- To establish a management system for E.A.R.S. volunteer teams to handle their upkeep, readiness and deployment, as well as for supporting their families in events when they are deployed for emergencies or disasters.

Through the receipt of funds from the Canadian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade Development (CDFAT) we have managed to train nearly 360 persons throughout 5 parishes to date.
